of disappearing in
Northern Britain
due to slugs

Leaves of Salvia nemorosa were used in Turkish medicine to stop bleeding by applying them externally

Salvia's genus comes from the Latin salveo, meaning 'to save,' referencing its reported medicinal properties

Did you know?

Salvia nemorosa is just one of many perennial salvia hardy to zone 5

(along with lyrata, sylvestris, superba, verticillata and others)

Did you know?

Salvia are in the *Lamiaceae* family and first cousins to *Nepeta* (Catmint), *Mentha* (true mint) and *Monarda* (bee balm)
